#### THE 80/20 RULE FOR SOCIAL MEDIA

A few weeks ago I had the privilege of attending our New Mexico Annual Conference, the yearly gathering of pastors and church leaders of the United Methodist Church in New Mexico. Bill Killough and Wayne Sharp were the representatives from Peralta Memorial UMC, and Micky Killough was an alternate member. This year's Annual Conference was in Roswell. Next year's Annual Conference will be in Las Cruces in early June.


New at Annual Conference this year were "Early Bird Sessions" presented the day before the official start of the conference. There were many topics we could choose from, and one of the sessions I attended was about effectively using social media like Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter to promote your church. Our presenter was Rev. D.G. Hollums, a friend and colleague of mine who recently served as the pastor of High Desert UMC in Rio Rancho. For the past year, Rev. Hollums worked in Nashville as the Minister of Online Engagement with United Methodist Communications. He worked to craft the presence of the United Methodist Church on social media at a denominational level.

One of the recurring themes in Rev. Hollums's presentation is the *80/20 Rule for Social Media*. Many of you have probably already heard of the *80/20* rule in churches and volunteer organizations, where it is sometimes estimated that twenty percent of the people do eighty percent of the work. However, in social media, the *80/20* Rule is different. On Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram, eighty percent of the church's posts should be about non-church events and only twenty percent of the posts should be about activities directly related to the church.

At first thought, this 80/20 Rule for Social Media seems contrary to our reason for having a social media account. Aren't we supposed to promote the church? Well, in social media, the goal is to create community. Have you ever had a friend who keeps talking and talking about himself, and never lets anyone get a word in edgewise? It doesn't foster very good conversation, and eventually people stop paying attention. Similarly, in social media, people want to see and hear the church engaging the community, not just talking about itself. When I heard this, the light bulb in my brain lit up! I had always seen our social media presence as something of a bulletin board instead of an opportunity to build community and engage in dialogue.

What, then, should the church be posting on social media? Some ideas include comments on local, national, and worldwide current events and stories about the ways the church engages the world around us. Pictures and memes (with text in the photo) get a lot more eyeballs than simple words. The online community savors discussion and engagement, even though online discussions will never fully replace personal conversations. Then, once people online recognize that the church cares about the community and that their comments are welcome, folks online will pay more attention to the twenty percent of postings about events at the church that are also posted online.

What would happen if we aligned all our outreach efforts with the 80/20 Rule for Social Media? What if, instead of talking all about the church, we engaged people in our community in issues that mattered to them? Did Jesus do this? How might such a principle change the way we are disciples of Christ? It's something for us all to ponder, and it might help shape the way we do ministry.

Cinema" — which all encouraged them to 'follow Jesus, the Light of the World'. Each day also included a Bible point and verse.

All of this takes lots of work, planning, and dedication so we thank Shawnda Lumpkin, Robyn Albani and Melodie Huff and LOTS of others....not to mention many thanks to all the parents, too.

With 80 children enrolled in VBS, wouldn't it be wonderful to see an increase in all of our Children's ministries? Let's pray and dedicate ourselves to that cause.









### Hymn History

#### The Star-Spangled Banner-1814

"For our citizenship is in heaven, from which we also eagerly wait for the Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ." Philippians 3:20



It was a deadly September attack on America. Casualties on our own shores. The nation's capitol targeted. The White House in danger. Terror. Heroes.

One hero was Francis, a Georgetown attorney heavily involved in national politics. An evangelical Christian, Francis taught Bible classes and witnessed boldly, once telling a friend in Congress, "Christ alone can save you from the sentence of condemnation." He also wrote hymns like this one:

Lord, with glowing heart I'd praise Thee, / For the bliss Thy love bestows, For the pardoning grace that saves me, / And the peace that from it flows; Help, O God, my weak endeavor; / This dull soul to rapture raise; Thou must light the flame, or never Can my love be warmed to praise.

But nothing prepared Francis for the hostage-recovery mission he undertook at the request of the president of the United States. He was seeking the release of a prominent physician, Dr. Beanes, who had been taken captive. During that assignment he was detained by enemy troops and forced to watch a brutal assault on the eastern seaboard.

Toward the morning of September 14, 1814, when it became clear that American forces had withstood the 25-hour bombardment, Francis Scott Key penned another hymn, scribbling it on the back of an envelope. The first stanza we as know, but have you ever sung the last stanza of "The Star-Spangled Banner"?

Blest with victory and peace, may the heaven-rescued land Praise the Power that hath made and preserved us a nation!

Then conquer we must when our cause it is just.

And this be our motto: "In God is our trust."

And the star-spangled banner in triumph shall wave
O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave.

After sunrise, the British released Francis, and back in Baltimore he wrote out this hymn in fuller form and showed it to his brother-in-law, who promptly gave it to a printer who ran off handbills for distribution on the streets. One copy landed in the hands of an unknown musician who adapted it to the tune "To Anacreon in Heaven." So was born the patriotic hymn that was to become our national anthem.


