Going Beyond Our Walls to Build God's Kingdom

## TO BE A SAINT

"The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed that someone took and sowed in his field; <sup>32</sup> it is the smallest of all the seeds, but when it has grown it is the greatest of shrubs and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches." – Matthew 13:31-32

Frederick Buechner, that perceptive writer and minister, once wrote an epigram summarizing what the Christian Scriptures openly teach us about saints. "In His holy flirtation with the world, God occasionally drops a handkerchief . . . [and] these handkerchiefs are called saints." Frankly, that description helps me as it offers us a portrait of faithful living anchored in the assumption that our God actually remains in-love with every last one of us despite the fact that we are quite literally, Hell-bent on pursuing the very things that will mar the image of the Creator in our lives.

Each year on the weekend closest to the first day of November, we celebrate All Saints Sunday by considering the many ways we can act in solidarity with all those who have gone before us by leaving our own enduring legacy of blessing to others. Actually, the impulse to do this sort of thing is a very old tradition among Christians, dating all the way back to that lost Roman world in which the dead would be buried outside the walls of a city in a necropolis (literally, a "city of the dead") of their own. Richard Lischer of Duke University says that this is the oldest form of segregation, "Not 'separate but equal' but 'dead, therefore separate.'" But from our very beginning, the Church of Jesus Christ did something utterly unthinkable within that kind of early, pagan society: "The Church said, in effect, 'We see dead people, and, behold, they are good.' So Christians began taking their bread and wine and holy books out into the cemeteries where the faithful were buried and began worshiping with them. Then they did something even more radical. In the Sixth Century they began moving their dead inside the walls and onto sacred ground where they could be nestled around the church, and some of them they moved into the church. They began treating the dead saints as friends, invisible companions, and teachers."

So what exactly do these Christian saints of ours teach us, and what can we learn from remembering them? Here is Lischer's answer: "They are God's faculty . . . they teach the hardest subjects, the kind that, when you're honest with yourself you say, 'I could use a tutor,' subjects that even the world has not yet mastered and perhaps never will. They teach us how to forgive. They teach us how to say 'No' to power. They teach us how to forget our own problems and to serve others. But most of all, the saints teach us how to die. . . They are the ones who quietly incorporate the routines and the indignities of dying into their walk with Jesus and thereby turn their walk into a witness."

As a case in point, the story of Thérèse of Lisieux may be instructive to those who are tempted to underestimate the soul-shaping significance of their own humble circumstances. Typically remembered by many as a saint because of her famous "little way" of spirituality, Thérèse entered a monastery at age 15, and died of tuberculosis only nine years later. Obviously, that is not much time to work with, but if you ask what of importance was available for Thérèse to learn and experience in such a tragically shortened life, you find in her writing that she remains busy looking for ways to cultivate love in her ordinary, daily encounters with family and friends. For instance, on one occasion after learning about the impending execution of a criminal, she commits herself to prayer on his behalf, making intercession for him in the hope that he will turn to God before the end of his life. She even finds herself moved to prayer while bent over a laundry trough in her convent, frustrated by the rudeness of a nun standing next to her who has been splashing Thérèse with dirty water. Offering up the aggravation of that moment in love to her Lord Jesus, she writes a confession to the leader of her religious community: "My dear Mother, you can see that I am a very little soul and that I can offer God only very little things." But apparently her devotion to Jesus in this "little way" did the trick. For as one scholar observes, "When she got around to writing her autobiography at the ripe old age of 23, she had already dived into this pond named God so deeply that she neglects to tell her readers that she was dying of Tuberculosis."

What will become of the life that has been entrusted to you? God has planted his seed in each of us and there is a lifetime to let it grow and deepen, or we can fight this seed's growing. We can grow as humans, as saints, as Christ's or we can kill this life in us as it struggles to be born. By God's grace I want this seed of the kingdom to grow in myself and in others until finally in all of us it becomes a tree where the birds of the air come and make their nests in our branches. I believe this is what matters most of all really.




Crafty Ladies will be busy, busy, busy in November. The time for the Bazaar is finally here!!
